FOUNDATION GRANTS impact every academic discipline and grade level in our district. Since 1991, thanks to the generosity of alumni, parents, teachers, friends and the community, the Foundation has awarded more than \$900,000 in teacher grants. In 2019 alone, grants totaling nearly \$40,000 provided support to a variety of unique opportunities for students of all ages:

- Two "Sherlock Bones" kits enable OHS Forensic Science students to **become forensic anthropologists** as they identify skeletal remains.
- Thanks to a giant map of Ohio, geography becomes a hands-on experience, allowing students to study physical features, political influence and historical events with the interactive tool.
- Idea Labs, established at Smith Elementary and Harman School, create classroom extensions where students can be curious, design, explain, play and explore.
- WAVE on Wheels, presented by the Newport Aquarium, enhances the OJH science curriculum, allowing 7th graders to **interact with marine animals** such as sharks, stingrays, and penguins.
- Soaring the Skies: Using Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) teaches physics concepts to OHS Physical Science students through the study of the science underlying unmanned flight.
- New equipment, including musical instruments, balance beam and funnel ball game, at Lange School helps students **improve coordination** and increase concentration through creative play.
- A large format poster printer at OJH and OHS gives students the ability to create well-rounded portfolios and large format designs found in engineering and architectural workplaces.
- Yoga mats for Lange School students provide a yoga and stretching program for Oakwood's youngest learners.
- Interactive science instruction from Boonshoft Museum and Glen Helen Raptor Center at Smith Elementary enables students hands-on study of motion, energy and animals' habitats and characteristics.
- A saltwater fish tank at OHS facilitates the study and care of saltwater habitats for science students and allows the newly formed Oakwood Coral Club to maintain the system.
