SCHOOL NEWS | Foundation Grants Total Surpasses \$1 Million To Oakwood Schools

The grants have ranged from requests for the fine arts to sciences and have come from each of the districts five schools. In its latest grant cycle, which closed in January 2022, the Foundation supported more than \$100,000 in grant requests, the largest grant cycle in its history.

2022 Asphalt Roadway Resurfacing

The 2022 asphalt repaving project will take place on the streets identified below. The City Public Works Department will do some utility work and tree trimming on these streets in advance of the repaving. Property owners on these roadways will receive direct notification from the city regarding the repaving schedule. The repaving project typically takes about one week to complete.

2022 CenterPoint Gas Line Improvements

CenterPoint (formerly Vectren) continues replacing underground gas distribution pipes and home service lines in Oakwood neighborhoods. The maps on the city website identify work programmed for 2022. In all work areas, CenterPoint is installing new polyethylene pipes in place of old steel and cast iron pipes and is moving indoor gas meters to outside wall locations. This is the continuation of a multi-year CenterPoint infrastructure replacement project in Oakwood scheduled to be completed in 2023. Oakwood residents personally affected by the work will receive detailed information from CenterPoint. Annual Fire Hydrant Flushing

The annual fire hydrant flushing will begin the week of April 4 and last approximately four weeks. Please check the City website for the dates of flushing in your neighborhood.

2022 Concrete Street Repairs

Repairs will be made to several concrete streets throughout Oakwood, which may include concrete replacement or asphalt patching. The City will inform impacted property owners prior to the start of work.

Point Broadband City-wide Fiber Installation Project

Point Broadband, a private internet and telecommunications provider, announced their arrival to the region as a new utility provider that will offer fiber-to-the-home service. Construction permits have been requested in Oakwood. The City will continue to share information about the project as it progresses via the City website, Facebook page, and at public meetings. After final city permits are issued, residents can expect to see crews identifying underground utilities and marking their location with temporary paint and flags. Point Broadband work will take place in the public right-of-way (including curb lawns) and in utility easements as they install utility cabinets and pedestals, as well as the fiber optic cable. Point Broadband will announce when construction will begin in neighborhoods via a series of messages which may include letters, postcards, and yard markers. City staff will work with Point Broadband to ensure restoration and screening are completed as required by city code. Construction is expected to take place on every Oakwood street and will include installation of underground fiber lines, and various above ground appurtenances as shown below:

Prescription Drug Drop-off Box

A locked prescription drug drop-off box is available in the lobby entrance to the city building located at 30 Park Avenue. This drop box offers a way for residents to conveniently dispose of unwanted or expired prescription drugs and is accessible to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

The items that are accepted for safe disposal include: prescription medications, medication patches, over-the-counter medications, vitamins, medication samples, and unwanted medications for pets. Items that cannot be accepted include: liquids of any kind, gels, ointments, needles, inhalers, aerosol cans, and medications from businesses or clinics. This program is not designed for commercial use. Businesses should dispose of medications according to state and federal guidelines. All items collected from the drop box are processed for destruction according to state and federal law.



Is Your Garage Sale Sign in the Right Spot?

With spring approaching, it is time for garage sale signs to start appearing, so here are a few reminders.

- Signs advertising for a garage sale are permitted at the garage sale location only.
- No directional or lead-in garage sale signs are permitted in the City's right-of-way or on any property that is not the premises of the garage sale.
- Signs in violation of this regulation will be removed.

Garage sales are permitted in residential zoning districts from 8:00 a.m. to sundown on weekdays and Saturdays, and from 9:00 a.m. to sundown on Sundays and holidays. Garage sales do not require a permit, but may only be held for three (3) consecutive days, with a limit of two garage sales in a calendar year.

Spring Crime Prevention Tips

The Oakwood Public Safety Department offers a few tips to keep yourself and your home safe during the spring and summer months.

- With the arrival of warmer temperatures, many people open windows or sliding glass doors while they are at home. Always remember to close and lock your windows and doors before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Remember to lock any shed, storage unit, or garage you have on your property.
- Be aware of home improvement scams. If you did not solicit the contractor or salesman, investigate the company before making the decision to do business with that person.
- If a utility representative comes to your house, request identification. True representatives will carry their identification and they will gladly show it to you.



If necessary, contact the company or Oakwood Public Safety Department for verification.

- Historically, during the warmer weather months, personal property crimes increase. Residents tend to leave items such as bicycles, gardening tools, lawnmowers, and other yard tools out in the open. Make sure you lock up your personal property when unattended. It does not take long for someone to quickly take your property that has been left in the yard.
- Always remember to roll up your car windows and remove valuables, even if your vehicle is parked in your driveway.
- Being a good neighbor can be one of the best crime prevention tools. If you observe any unusual or suspicious activity, please contact the Oakwood Public Safety Department at (937) 298-2122.



2021 Oakwood Income Tax Returns Due April 18

The city of Oakwood has a mandatory filing requirement for all residents. Every individual, 18 years of age or older, who resides in Oakwood, must file an Oakwood City income tax return, whether or not there is any taxable income to report. Retired residents who have income derived exclusively from non-taxable sources (interest, dividend, social security and/or pension income, etc.) must first file a final return in order to be exempt from the filing requirement.

If you have filed for an extension of time to file your federal return, you will automatically receive an Oakwood extension. You should attach a copy of your federal extension to your return when filing so that you will not be charged a late filing penalty. Your extended return is due the same date as your extended federal return – October 17, 2022. If you do not have a federal extension, you may still obtain an Oakwood extension. Simply complete an extension request form, located on the City's web site, and submit your request by April 18, 2022. As always, an extension of time to file your returns does not extend the time to pay your taxes. All taxes paid after April 18, 2022 will be subject to a 15% late payment penalty and interest.

The 2021 Oakwood income tax return is available on the City's web site at www.oakwoodohio.gov. If you do not have internet access, forms will be made available at the City administrative offices, Wright Memorial Public Library and the Oakwood Community Center.

Full-year residents with W-2 wage income only will be able to file their 2021 City of Oakwood income tax return online. Visit the City's website for additional information.

Important Note for Remote Workers: Remote work (also known as work from home or telecommuting) is a type of flexible working arrangement that allows an employee to work from a remote location outside of corporate offices. Due to the coronavirus pandemic, this arrangement has become increasingly popular. If you were working at home during all or part of 2021, yet your form W-2 shows that your wages were withheld for another municipality, you are entitled to a refund for the taxes withheld to that city and will shift your tax dollars to Oakwood; you may also reduce your overall local tax liability. You are only subject to the other city's income tax for the time actually worked in that city.

If you need assistance with the preparation of your Oakwood return, please contact the Tax Department at (937) 298-0531 to schedule an appointment. Normal business hours for the tax office are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended hours will be provided April 13-15, when the office will be open until 6:00 p.m.

Spring Styrofoam Recycling Event

The city of Oakwood is partnering with Green Oakwood to provide a spring Styrofoam recycling event for the Oakwood community. Styrofoam will be collected at the 24/7 public-access recycling facility located at the front entrance to the J. David Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard, on Saturday, April 23 from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Green Oakwood will transport the collected Styrofoam to the Montgomery County Environmental Services Styrofoam recycling event.

Aside from Styrofoam recycling, the Public Works Center will be open that day for mulch pickup consistent with the article below. No other Public Works services will be available that day.

Refuse Program

One of our primary city services is collection and disposal of refuse including household trash, recyclables, bulk items, and green waste. Given the enormous number of trees in Oakwood and the extensive landscaping throughout our city, we generate a very large amount of green waste (yard debris). Roughly 20-25% of the cost to operate our refuse program is related to the green waste collection and disposal. Picking Up After Your Pets

Dogipot stations are available throughout the City to help pet owners with an easy and safe clean-up (see city website for location map). There are few things that aggravate neighbors more than a pet owner who does not clean up after their pet. Besides being an unsightly mess, a number of common diseases can be transmitted to pets and people through feces. Failing to clean up after your pet is fineable under the Oakwood General Offenses Code. Please be a responsible pet owner and help keep our Oakwood community clean.

Leash Law

Dogs are required to be securely leashed and under the reasonable control of the owner, keeper or agent thereof whenever they are on public sidewalks, streets or any other public rights-of-way. This applies to all dogs in Oakwood, but there are certain exceptions for service animals and for dogs using the Creager Field Dog Park. Oakwood is densely populated and we have a very large number of dogs... around 1,000 registered in Oakwood, where we have nearly 4,000 homes. The leash law is designed to mitigate the unpredictability of dogs and to protect both citizens and other animals from unexpected and unwanted encounters. Even the most well-trained dogs, under the right set of circumstances, can be unpredictable. Citizens should be able to move about the public sidewalks and rights-of-way freely and without concern or fear from unleashed dogs.



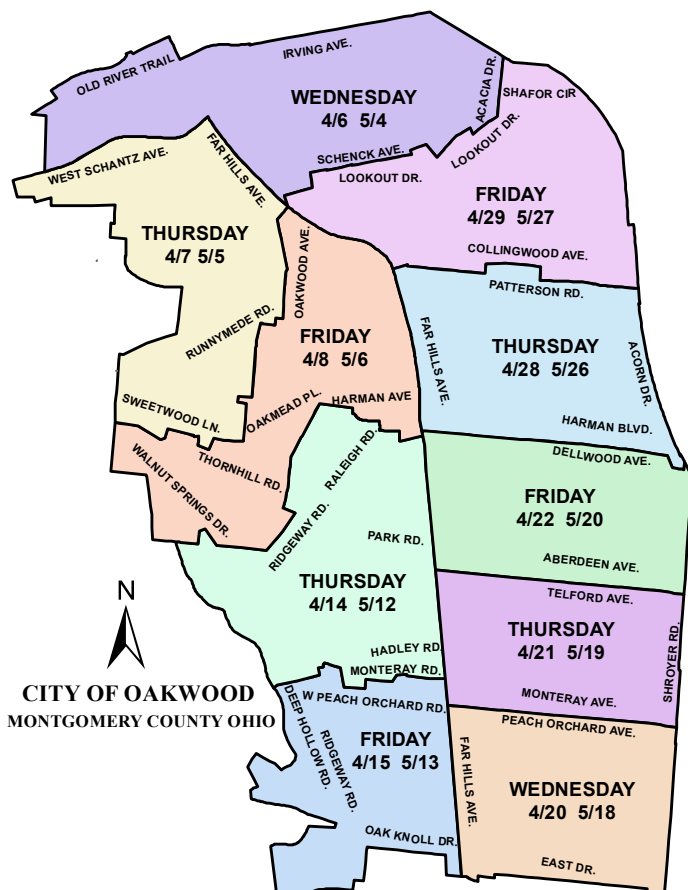
2022 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Project

The 2022 Sidewalk, Curb and Driveway Apron Repair Project will take place in the area west of Far Hills Avenue. The purpose of the project is to maintain the concrete structures located within the city rights-of-way in good, safe condition. We have inspected the areas and marked sections of concrete requiring repairs. Residents affected by the work will receive personal notification regarding their responsibilities. Please call Public Works Foreman David Shuey at (937) 298-0777 if you have any questions. For those who choose to do the repair work themselves, please remember to obtain a permit in advance and that all work must be completed and inspected by May 13.

Leaf Mulch Program

Citizens have two options again this year for obtaining leaf mulch. For those who want mulch delivered, we offer 3 cubic yards for \$100 and 6 cubic yards for \$150. Please call (937) 298-0777 to place an order. Mulch deliveries will take place on five Saturdays from April 9 to May 7. On the same five Saturdays, residents can obtain free mulch from the Foell Public Works Center at 210 Shafor Blvd. between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., but must haul the material themselves and must provide proof of residency. The free mulch is for Oakwood residents only and no commercial vehicles are permitted.

Oakwood Rotary Hazardous Waste Pickup

There are two ways for residents to properly dispose of household hazardous material. Residents may: 1) drop off the material at the Montgomery County Refuse Transfer Station (see www.mcswd.org for more information); or 2) use the quarterly Oakwood Rotary Club Hazardous Waste Collection program. The 2022 collection dates are Saturday, April 23, Saturday, July 23 and Saturday, October 22. Call (937) 296-5155 to sign up for the service. It is provided free of charge, but the Oakwood Rotary Club accepts donations. Donations to the "Oakwood Rotary Club Foundation" can be placed in an envelope and left with the items being disposed, or may be mailed to: Oakwood Rotary Club Foundation, PO Box 512, Dayton, OH 45409. Oakwood Sustainability Measures

Over the past several decades, the city of Oakwood has implemented numerous measures to address matters of the environment and provide for the betterment of Oakwood and the greater community. See the city website for a detailed list of the measures.

Lawn Treatment on City-Owned Public Lawn Areas

Well-kept lawns and green spaces within the City are an important part of the health of these areas and maintaining Oakwood's ambience. The City has used Integrated Pest Management (IPM) practices for a number of years on the city-owned public lawn areas which include parks, boulevards, athletic fields, and around public buildings. IPM is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties. Pesticides are used only after monitoring indicates they are needed according to established guidelines, and treatments are made with the goal of removing only the target organism. Pest control materials are selected and applied in a manner that minimizes risks to human health, beneficial and non-target organisms, and the environment. Our practices include adherence to proper mowing heights and the use of sharp blades on mowers which helps reduce the amount of chemicals used in all of the public areas. The City requires that all lawn care contractors, whether treating for pests or weeds, are properly licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and follow all applicable laws and rules promulgated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

In our parks, lawn care treatments require the posting of temporary signage in conspicuous locations at least two days prior to treatment. The day of treatment, the City Horticulturist and/or Recreation Supervisor meet the contractor on-site prior to the application of any treatment. They ensure that children are not present in the area to be treated and that the area is otherwise clear for the application, before allowing the contractor to proceed with lawn treatment. Immediately following treatment, the City verifies that all signs are properly placed, and are then promptly removed 24 hours thereafter. Only areas with weeds and pests are spot sprayed, not always the entire green space as this is a part of the IPM practice to limit chemical use yet still keep the community greenspace as healthy as possible. Is Your Home Ready for Spring?

Warm weather is upon us and, with it, a need to look over your property after the winter months. Please consider the following questions to determine if and what exterior repairs are needed in order to remain in compliance with Oakwood's Property Maintenance Code.



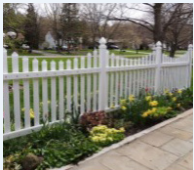
Yard

- Are all weeds and grass less than 8 inches in height?
- Is the yard free from overgrown, uncontrolled vegetation, and fallen tree branches?
- Is the yard free from miscellaneous storage, debris, and refuse?
- Are sidewalks clear of plant overgrowth?
- Are all vehicles licensed, operable, and parked on a paved surface?



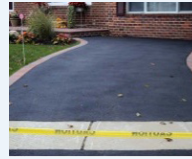
Exterior Walls & Garages

- Do they have any holes or cracks, or are they in need of paint?
- Is siding in need of cleaning from algae, mildew, or mold?



Accessory Buildings (sheds, fences, etc.)

- Are fences and shed walls, doors, and roofs in good repair?
- Do sheds or fences need to be painted?



Driveway & Walkways

- Are they free of potholes and raveling?
- Are they free from debris, storage, and refuse?



Porches

- Do the steps, railings, or floorboards need to be repaired or replaced?
- Is it free from debris, storage, and refuse?



Gutters & Downspouts

- Do they need to be painted or repaired?
- Do they direct water away from the primary building?



Windows & Doors

- Are they weather tight and operable?
- Is any glass broken or missing?
- Do the screens need to be repaired or replaced?
- Do the sashes and/or trim need to be repaired or repainted?



Spring Yard and Garden Cleanup

The City collects yard debris from property frontages monthly from January through September, and bi-weekly from October through December. Refer to the enclosed map for your scheduled pickup days and please plan your work accordingly. Here are a few things to remember:

- Place larger piles of yard debris including brush and branches in the tree lawn area just behind the curb. Branches should be no longer than 6 feet and should be placed in manageable piles. Do not place these piles around trees, fire hydrants, cable TV boxes or posts/poles.
- Do not place any yard debris in the street or gutter line, except leaves during the fall leaf collection season.
- Under no circumstance should you place anything except yard debris for pick-up in the tree lawn area.
- The City will not pick up contractor generated yard debris.
- If you have a large amount of yard debris, please call for a free dumpster, but remember that this dumpster must only include yard debris.
- Do not stack loose yard debris around or on top of your garbage cans.
- Please remember the 35 gallon and 60-pound limits on trash cans and that all cans must have lids.
- Grass clippings are not accepted, either with regular trash or curbside yard debris collection, or at the recycling and yard waste drop-off site. Please use a mulching mower or home composting.

The Foundation also strives to support a variety of projects through grants, ensuring each student is given the opportunity of an excellent and innovative educational experience. In the Winter 2022 cycle, the Foundation was able to grant funds for an innovative and exciting 3-D Anatomy Dissecting table. While outside of the Foundation's grant endowment budget, the Trustees recognized that this opportunity complemented the late Ruth Herman's legacy. Ruth was an Oakwood Schools Foundation Dream Builder and committed OHS Class of 1947 alum. In honor and memory of the pioneer for women in the sciences and in the spirit of her endless pursuit of learning, the Foundation Trustees voted to release funds from Ruth Herman's undesignated bequest gift to the Foundation to cover the anatomy table. This table will be the first of its kind for a public school in Ohio and will give students an opportunity to learn about anatomy and physiology at an advanced level.

The new space will be acoustically tuned, and include more area for practice and class activities as well as expanded storage space for instruments and instruction.

With the community's support, construction on the new arts wing which will be located on the Northeast corner of campus is slated to begin this summer. 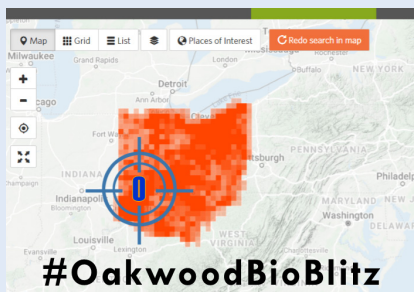

A Renovated, Refreshed Wright Library

In Spring 2020, it became clear that it was the right time to begin a construction project at Wright Library: taxpayers passed an operations levy; the lower level was already closed because of COVID, interest rates were at an all-time low, and there were concerns that construction costs were going to rise. With infrastructure aging out, it was time to begin the work.

The project was taken to a new level as private donors emerged: first, a \$500,000 gift from former Oakwood resident David Flory. Other significant gifts followed, allowing Wright Library to modernize the building while maintaining its beloved historic integrity. (Read more about the gifts that supported this project at wrightlibrary.org/foundation.)

This spring, Wright Library emerges as a renewed, refreshed community anchor. The project finished on time and under budget. The project included:

- Infrastructure updates essential to the healthy maintenance of the building, including energy-efficient LED lighting, a new 20-year roof, boosted wifi and cellular connectivity, and modernized HVAC and elevator system.
- Living room-style spaces have been added throughout the building, furnished with historically-sensitive chairs and tables that provide many spaces for both groups and individual study, as well as a fireplace added to the South Reading room.
- New technology-enhanced meeting spaces create opportunities for the community to collaborate and connect.
- The building is more accessible than ever, with improved walkways to both the Main and Park Level entrances, as well as new ADA and family-friendly parking along Aberdeen Avenue. A Holds Pick Up locker in the new Park Level vestibule allows borrowers to pick up materials anytime between 6 a.m. to midnight.
- The new children and teen areas are bright and open spaces for collaboration, reading, and learning.
- A new Children's Terrace creates a vibrant area for outdoor activities.

We will be unveiling the first of our historic markers commemorating the 1872 platting of Oakwood.

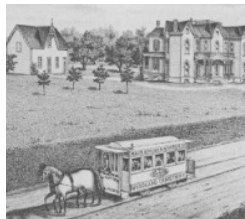
Free docent led historical walking tours of the "town" will be offered immediately following the unveiling.
