Like a merry-go-round on one of his PlayCare installations, Michael Whalen is about to come full circle with Oakwood Schools. Starting off on the Harman School playground as a grade-schooler, Michael graduated from OHS in 2004, and then the University of Dayton with a B.S. in Entrepreneurship and Finance as well as an MBA. Michael then purchased PlayCare Playground Specialists in May of 2013, and at that time, the company performed cleaning and maintenance on indoor playgrounds in Ohio, and its border states. Now under Michael's leadership, he and the PlayCare team are continually looking at developing the scope of the business both in service and geographical reach.

That approach seems to be gliding along as PlayCare Playground Specialists has grown 30% every year, expanded into a larger facility, and is servicing over 600 customers in 8 states. Their turnkey offering now includes playground design, sale, installation, cleaning, and repair. The company's success has also enabled PlayCare to give back substantially to the community. In the past two years, PlayCare has provided over \$1 million in new equipment to the local Dayton community and contributed over \$300,000 toward those projects through in-kind and direct donations. PlayCare's philanthropic outreach has focused on local projects with religious institutions, COSI, The Boonshoft Museum, Dayton Children's Hospital, Council on Rural Services, United Rehabilitation Services, Sinclair Community College, and many private and public schools.

Giving back is important to Michael, and he is proud to be able to provide safe, fun environments for kids to grow and play. One of such projects this summer will be the privately-funded Lange Kindergarten playground (see image) - a project his children will have the pleasure of experiencing themselves in a few years. Other PlayCare projects include another school playground as well as smaller custom projects in local parks.

New Alumni Plaza to be Ready for Homecoming Crowd

The concept of the Alumni Plaza evolved in 2017 when a member of the Class of 1967 wanted to learn about the District's needs. In reviewing those needs, it was the proposal for an "Alumni Plaza" to be installed in one of the most highly traveled areas on the OHS/OJH campus that intrigued the alum, who represented a private foundation.

"The Alumni Plaza moved from concept to reality because one of our alumni provided OSF with a matching fund donation of \$50,000. Many more alumni and friends generously came forward to support the project. The Alumni Plaza is another example of the OSF's partnership with Oakwood Schools and our goal to provide quality opportunities and facilities for students and staff. The OSF will continue to explore new opportunities to privately fund district-wide improvements," OSF Board Chair Chris Conard ('76) said.

The transformed outdoor space, located near the south entrance of OJH on East Schantz Ave., will serve many purposes for school and community groups. A point of interest in the plaza will be a large brick paver circle encompassing a block "O" for Oakwood. Within the circle, paver bricks have been engraved with the names of generous donors who helped support the project. OHS classes ranging from 1950 to 2035 will be recognized on the paver bricks. With plenty of seating and new landscaping, the plaza will promote social interactions and define the main entrance to the building from East Schantz Ave. The design for the plaza also addressed the drainage issues in the area.

An official ceremony dedicating the area to Oakwood Schools and its students past, present and future will be held this fall.

Class Updates

The Remarkable Mrs. Wood

As I read the alumni articles and class updates in the Oakwood Alumni Association newsletter, I ask myself what difference Oakwood High School made in my life of 78 years. One experience stands out for me- the role of Mr. Woodbridge in a senior class play - "The Remarkable Incident at Carson Corners" thanks to the School's Drama Teacher Mrs. Signe Wood, who had

confidence in me that I could perform before an audience in the School's auditorium. That might seem somewhat off-line in terms of traditional academics, but here is why it made a difference.

One of the hallmarks of my life has been television news. It started in college at Ohio State where I spent my weekends as a news reporter at WLW-C (NBC) in Columbus. It continued after college at WMUR-TV (ABC) in New Hampshire where I reported on stories in Central New England and anchored the news at 6:00 and 11:00. More than once, I have thought back to Mrs. Wood who urged me to take a lead role in the School play, and how that lit a spark of confidence in my ability to communicate in front of an audience, and evolved into reporting news stories in front of a TV camera and a large audience --larger than the audience in the Oakwood High School auditorium.

And it was even a larger audience when I reported a story on the ABC Evening News about the OPEC oil embargo in the mid-1970s and the purchase of Russian oil by a New England energy company to heat New England homes. At 78, I'm still producing a business news show on WMUR-TV (ABC) every Sunday morning – as a hobby.

It has been my hobby. I don't collect stamps or baseball cards. But, it hasn't been my occupation in life. There's a common thread between my hobby communicating on television, and with my various occupations where communicating has been my ticket to serve as a public spokesman for a U.S. Senator, a public relations executive for a Boston law firm, and a corporate communications advisor to a global photovoltaic company. The common thread continued in my home state of NH where I led a telecommunications association, founded a forum called "Politics and Eggs" that hosts all candidates for President every four years in advance of NH's first in the nation presidential primary, and co-founded NH's Forum on the Future – both of which continue to this day. For these and other pursuits, I was surprised and honored with a NH Business Leader of the Year Award in 2007.



So, while I thank several individuals along the way, it's crystal clear to me that Mrs. Wood saw something in me and put me in a position on stage to know it. Add to that my appreciation of the English language from teacher Maria Bender, and the value of teamwork from football coach, Ed Wysocki – Oakwood High School primed me for the life I would end up living - even though I didn't get that many A's (:




It should be a movie, I thought. I decided to study the way to break into film and Google took me to The American Film Market in Los

The company has steadily grown, even as it remained a one-woman business.

Peg's Salt is now sold in Food Lion and Whole Foods markets in Virginia, Amazon Prime, and dozens of other stores – including Dorothy Lane Market and Arrow Wine. She will be supplying some OHS friends with small jars as wedding favors this fall.

In July, the company moved into a custommade production site at

Vector Industries, a nonprofit organization in Waynesboro, VA, that employs disabled workers. Vector employees will support Peg's Salt in labelling, warehousing, and distribution. 
